



Adam Boyd was selected as Firefighter of the Year for demonstrating all the qualities of a Burbank Firefighter and setting a high standard of excellence in his character and service.



STATION STATS

BFD has six strategically located fire stations and a training center. Frontline emergency response apparatus include six engines companies, two truck companies, three paramedic rescue ambulances, a hazardous materials response vehicle, a water tender, a brush patrol and a command vehicle. Each unit dispatched counts as one response, hence a single incident may involve multiple units dispatched and, therefore, multiple responses.

Incidents include Fire Suppression, Emergency Medical Service, Technical Rescue, Hazardous Materials, Wildland Fire Services, Service, and other service calls. Unit responses also include those outside the Verdugo System.

RESPONSE TIMES

Verdugo Fire Communications Center (VFCC) is jointly owned by Burbank, Glendale, and Pasadena and provides dispatch services to thirteen cities in the region. VFCC dispatches based on the closest available unit to ensure the quickest response to an emergency.

Response times begin upon dispatch of the resource and end upon arrival at the scene, taking in account for the donning of turnouts and driving to the dispatch location. In accordance with the National Fire Protection Agency standard, the 90th Percentile Baseline Performance Data is the total response time for the first unit on scene.






MUTUAL & AUTOMATIC AID

BFD maintains operational relationships with fire agencies that support the unified goal of protecting life, property and the environment by participating in several automatic and mutual aid systems. Below are the number of incidents to which Burbank was dispatched outside of city limits:



BFD supports state and federal incidents through the deployment of Strike Team resources. A Strike Team consists of a Chief Officer and five Fire Engines staffed by four members on each unit. The department also participates in Single Resource Assignments, which includes Division Chiefs, Crew Bosses, and Specialists in Logistics and Geographic Information.



FIRE PREVENTION

The primary responsibility of the Fire Prevention Bureau is to anticipate and reduce the potential for fire, life safety, and environmental hazards by enforcing relative laws, codes, and ordinances through inspections, permitting, and safety education programs.





TRAINING

BFD provides high-level training for emergency responders in the areas of “all-risk” incidents. Training includes skills a firefighter may need to perform in their line of duty, such as Auto Extrication, Company Development, Emergency Medical Services, Flashover, High-Rise Operations, Swiftwater Rescue, Ventilation, and Wildland Refresher. Multi-agency training is critical as large-scale response requires the coordination of multiple fire agencies and resources, including Burbank Police Department, Los Angeles County, and Glendale and Pasadena Fire Department. Below are key trainings:

- Forcible Entry and Hose: Coordination with Burbank Police Department’s Specialized Weapons and Tactics (SWAT) Team . Training includes forcible entry and hose operations in a hostage or barricaded situation.
- Hazardous Materials: With Los Angeles County and other responding fire agencies, Burbank Fire is responsible for technical response and specialized operations involving hazardous materials incidents.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

The City of Burbank's Emergency Operations Center and overall emergency management program is overseen by the BFD. This division coordinates mitigation, preparedness, and response and recovery activities for the city, as well as overseeing emergency preparedness volunteer groups.

- Coordinated response and recovery operations for significant rain and wind events
- Developed the framework and organization for the Tri-City Emergency Management Cooperative



BURBANK FIRE CORPS

This volunteer program officiates under the regulations of Disaster Service Workers to provide support services to the BFD and community. Functions of the program include Emergency Operations Center Support Staff, Emergency Logistics, Disaster Communications, Volunteer Fire Patrol, and emergency preparedness outreach to the community.

The Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) is offered to educate and prepare the public for potential emergencies. Over eight modules, participants are trained in disaster preparedness, disaster medical operations, fire safety and utility controls, and basic search and rescue, with an opportunity to join the Burbank Fire Corps.

BFD ASSIGNMENTS



Academy Peer Instructor

As a part of the Instructor Cadre, Peer Instructors work under the direction of the Primary Academy Instructor. Peer Instructors assist in the daily operations of the Training Academy, including instruction and demonstration of skills and responsibilities. Instructors are the support system for the firefighter recruits and are given the opportunity to offer additional assistance and coaching.



Paramedic

EMS incidents account for over 80% of emergency activities and have the greatest impact on resources. Functions performed by a Paramedic include Advanced Life Support (ALS) Treatments, which entails the addition of advanced airway, drug therapy, cardiac monitoring, and intravenous therapy. To maintain continuing education and improve service quality and best practices, BFD has a full-time Nurse Educator and dedicated EMS Battalion Chief and Fire Captain. The Department also retains the service and counsel of an EMS Medical Director.



Type 1 Hazardous Materials Response Team

BFD maintains a California Governor's Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES) Type 1 Hazardous Materials Response Team and provides Technical/Specialist HazMat response for the Area C Region. All BFD personnel are trained to the HazMat First Responder Operational level. On duty every day at Station 12, there are between 4-8 members who are trained to the HazMat Specialist level and cross-staff the HazMat 12 apparatus.



Urban Search and Rescue

BFD provides a wide range of technical rescue services to the community. Technical rescue incidents include vehicle extrication, confined space rescue, trench collapse, low/high angle rescue, swift water rescue, and building collapse. BFD provides awareness, operational knowledge and skills in coordination with Area C Urban Search & Rescue teams for most technical rescue incidents.

JOIN BFD

Minimum Requirements

- ▶ Must be at least 21 years of age at time of appointment
- ▶ Graduation from high school or equivalent
- ▶ United State citizenship or applied for citizenship at least one year prior to last day of filing application
- ▶ Valid California Class "C" driver's license or equivalent
- ▶ State of California Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) Certificate at time of appointment
- ▶ Completion of the Firefighter Candidate Testing Center (FCTC) Written Test with a passing score
- ▶ Must maintain the physical endurance, muscular strength, and agility to satisfactorily perform the essential functions of a Fire Fighter

Interview

This is a general review of a candidate's personal history. It is designed to evaluate reasoning and problem-solving abilities, as well as interpersonal and communication skills. The minimum passing score is **70**. This score will determine a candidate's rank on the eligibility list, which is valid for **one year**.

Pre-Background & Physical Agility Assessment

Candidates will be selected to move forward in the recruitment process and continue onto the background orientation. Candidates will then be required to complete the Biddle Exam, the physical agility assessment. This exam consists of 11 consecutive events that must be completed within 9 minutes and 34 seconds or less.

Background Investigation

The Background Investigation includes a thorough check of personal and employment histories along with contacting persons who know the candidate and can evaluate the candidate's potential as a Burbank Firefighter Recruit. There will also be a Truth Verification Examination of all records and statements.

Department Interview

The interview is conducted with the Fire Chief for final selection. Upon selection, the candidate will be given a conditional offer of employment with the Burbank Fire Department. After a Psychological Examination and Medical Evaluation, a final offer of employment will be provided to the candidate. Upon acceptance, the candidate will enter the Recruit Academy.
